

Over the past decade in NSW, the **total** number of adults on **remand** has increased by **88%**...

During the **same period**, the number of **Aboriginal adults on remand** has risen **150%**



Legal scholars have argued that **access to bail** is increasingly **restrictive**




In January 2015, a presumption **against** bail for **'show cause'** offences was introduced...

"A bail authority... must refuse bail unless the accused person shows cause why his or her detention is not justified." - Section 16A(1) of the *Bail Act 2013* (NSW)




NSW prison population

Over the past decade in NSW, the **remand** population has **increased**. The **sentenced** population grew earlier in the decade but has **recently declined.**



NSW remand population

Over the past decade in NSW, the number of **Aboriginal adults** on remand has increased substantially



Since March 2013...

Non-Aboriginal adults **76% increase** (an additional 1,559 adults)

Since March 2013...

Aboriginal adults 150% increase (an additional 1,059 adults)

At March 2024, 46% of Aboriginal adults in custody are



In 2020, NSW committed to the new National Agreement on **Closing the Gap**

Target 10: Adults are not overrepresented in the criminal justice system



By 2031, reduce the rate of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander adults held in incarceration by **at least 15 per cent** (based on 2019)

'NSW no longer on track to meet Closing the Gap target with "record high" Indigenous incarceration numbers'



The trend in the number of Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal adults proceeded against by NSW Police between 2012 and 2023




Did show cause impact access to bail for Aboriginal adults?


Measure the **likelihood** of being refused bail **one year before-and-after** the introduction of the 'show cause' requirement

"A bail authority... must refuse bail unless the accused person shows cause why his or her detention is not justified."



Estimate the change for **Aboriginal** and non-Aboriginal adults who have a **Court** bail hearing




'Show cause' and access to bail The likelihood of being remanded one year before-and-after the introduction of the show cause requirement

Are Aboriginal adults **increasingly** more likely to have their **bail revoked** over time?

How did we answer this?



Among adults **granted bail** by the Court, we measure the **likelihood** of being held on **remand at finalisation**




Estimate the **annual trend** in the likelihood among **Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal adults** between 2012 and 2022

Examine the **trend** in the **offence profile** among Aboriginal adults on **remand** between 2016 and 2022




We considered the following **DV-related offending**:

- **1. Any** DV-related charge(s)
- 2. A breach of an ADVO with concurrent DV-related charge(s)




We also considered **violent offending:**

- 3. Any **violent** offence charge(s)
- 4. A **non-DV violent** offence charge(s)



Trend in the offence profile

The **proportion** of Aboriginal adults **bail refused at finalisation** with any DV-related charge between 2016 and 2023



45.6%


Breach of ADVO and concurrent DV charge(s) 31% increase (an additional 698 people)

Since 2016...

6.5% increase with any violent offence charge(s) • An additional 857 people 5.1% increase with a non-DV related violent offence charge(s) • An additional 413 people

Reducing the remand population





Summary

Since 2013, the number of Aboriginal adults on remand has increased **150%**



The number of Aboriginal adults **proceeded** against by NSW police has increased 102% between 2012 and 2023



The introduction of the **show cause** requirement reduced access to bail



to have their **bail revoked**




Since 2016, the proportion of Aboriginal adults on remand with **DV-related** or **violent offences** has increased


Aboriginal adults are **consistently more likely**



Closing the Gap Target 10

What we could do **per year** to remove **50** Aboriginal adults from prison This represents 10% of the Target 10 reduction





Reducing entry into the criminal justice system (e.g.: crime prevention, diversion, response to risk

- Addressing the rise of bail refusal and the barriers
- to Aboriginal adults accessing bail

- Redirect from remand to bail, or alternatives
